

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All Staff Receive ALICE Training

In an effort to make sure we can provide as safe and secure learning environment as possible, all USD 411 teachers and staff will be participating in ALICE training on Tuesday Aug. 14. ALICE stands for Alert-Lockdown-Inform-Counter-Evacuate. ALICE is a national program providing a structure and framework for schools to ensure as safe and secure learning environment as possible for students and staff. The training will be provided by Marion County Sheriff Robert Craft and his officers. Sheriff Craft is a certified ALICE trainer. In addition to Goessel, he will be training other schools across Marion County using the ALICE technique. ALICE is endorsed by the U.S. Department of Education and the International Association of Chiefs of Police. The ALICE training will become a part of Goessel USD 411's Emergency Operating Procedure or EOP in their Crisis Plan. The training involves taking active steps and walking through various scenarios ranging from simply to alerting to taking counter measures and including evacuation. Sheriff Craft presented the program to the Board of Education last spring and the board adopted the program for use in the Crisis Plan. Both girls qualified for national competition at the state meeting in April, and they did a fantastic job in their events at NLC. Rachel received a gold medal and placed 9th in the nation for her Job Interview event, and Brooke received a silver medal and placed 21st for her Recycle and Redesign project, "Project Pillowcase: A Case for a Dress."

Besides competitions, the girls, along with their moms and Mrs. Hiebert, instructor, they had the chance to listen to speakers and attend workshops, see other students' creativity in their projects, and learn what other FCCLA members do at their schools around the country. There was also time for some sightseeing, and they were able to visit some of Atlanta's historical and cultural landmarks, including Civil War monuments, influential places during the civil rights movement, and Centennial Olympic Park, center of the 1996 Summer Olympic Games. Accreditation

The Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) has implemented a new process for the accreditation of schools, called Kansas Educational Systems Accreditatation, or KESA. USD 411 staff has been working the past two years to begin the process which officially started with the 2017-2018 school year. We started by conducting building and district needs assessments based on rubrics provided by KSDE and received feedback from staff, site councils, and the BOE. We then selected goal areas to focus on during the 5 year accreditation cycle. The goal areas we chose to focus on are Relevance and Relationships. Each building continues working to set specific goals and action plans within each area. Some of the main focuses of this work are increasing family engagement at each building and updating curriculum to ensure it is relevant and engaging. We also meet each year with a team of outside educators that review our progress and offer guidance and feedback.
