We read books, listened to songs, and did activities that helped reinforce these concepts.

Kindness is the theme of our first reading unit. The stories are helping us think about being thoughtful friends and how we can show kindness in many different situations. We are also increasing our vocabulary, improving our reading strategies, and working on our fluency. We are very excited that the high school football team is coming to our classroom on

English time finds us learning about the writing process. We have written some poems using poetry frames. We're learning about nouns, verbs, adjectives and writing sentences. We will be putting sentences together to make paragraphs and stories very soon.

Number sense and place value are keeping our brains busy in math. We are also figuring out that reading plays an important part in the many story problems that fill our math assignments. The problems can be tricky, so we often have to "think big" to figure them out. We like the *On the Spot* videos that give some helpful tips for tricky problems.

Living things have piqued our interest in science. Reptiles, birds, fish, and amphibians are all unique and wonderful creatures. We are also learning about environments and habitats and are creating a poster for each one that we learn about.

We have enjoyed going out to the school garden. We have helped harvest some vegetables, learned about bees and pollination, and discussed composting. We also took a mini field trip to the Bethesda butterfly garden to look for pollinators. We think it is fun to eat things we helped harvest in the garden in the school cafeteria!

We look forward to learning many new things together this year!

What's more fun than being a Super Artist?! Students started the year off by turning themselves into Super Heroes and have worked on some fun super hero themed projects. A big focus this year has been how art teaches us problem solving skills. We've worked on making "Beautiful Ooops" artwork that changes a mistake into something beautiful; this leads into our classroom rule that "it doesn't have to be perfect, you

just need to try your best." And everyone's best looks different! We read the books Ish and Dot by Peter Reynolds that teach us all how to be good artists and feel good about what we can do.

Here are some things each grade has learned so far:

- ♦ Kindergarten students can tell you how different colors show different moods, and the same can be said for lines! Ask them how to glue in Art class, and I bet they will say "Dot, dot, not a lot!"
- ♦ Ist grade students can tell you all the primary colors and what texture is. They just finished learning about Andy Warhol and how his pop art was bright and POPular!
- $\bullet$  2<sup>nd</sup> grade students can tell you what colors are "friends" or complimentary colors as well as warm and cool colors. They stepped into a time machine and came out in prehistoric times where we learned about cave paintings and even made a dinosaur!
- 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students got a nice review on primary, complimentary, and warm/cool colors before using primary colors to make their Mondrian inspired critters. They worked hard of designing their own patterns for their hot air balloons and even just finished up a fibers collage. This is a new project, the fibers collage, so be sure to check them out in the cafeteria for Parent Teacher Conferences!
- •4<sup>th</sup> grade did a unit that struck close to home, learning about graffiti and street art, what is good, what is bad, and why. That brought up a lot of positive conversation in light of a recent negative situation. They created their own graffiti and did a lot of study on pattern and color theory before finishing them.
- ♦5<sup>th</sup> grade has been doing a huge unit on self portraits, how to draw face features in the correct proportions. How to make them look realistic or stylized. They even made a super hero self portrait! This extensive unit focused on a

lot of techniques with colored pencil pressure, blending, and overlapping.

# Help your child learn from mistakes this school year

It's the beginning of a new school year and students have a fresh start. But it won't be long before they make a mistake on a homework assignment or test—and that's OK.

What matters is how children and parents respond to those mistakes. Instead of glossing over them, parents should help children learn from them. Research shows that when parents and teachers encourage students to learn from their errors, those children do better in school.

One reason may be that fixing mistakes shows kids they can improve—that "smarts" aren't something they either have or they don't. Intelligence can be increased. And when students understand their errors and don't repeat them, they become more optimistic about their own brainpower.

When reviewing your child's work this school year, first point out what he did well. Then, to help him learn from his mistakes:

- •Point them out. Rather than saying, "Don't worry—you'll do better on the next math test," ask if he understands why his answers were wrong. If so, have him work the problems again. If he's not sure, offer suggestions or encourage him to ask his teacher for help.
- •Praise progress. Did he miss only two problems on his latest math test? After reviewing his mistakes, remind him that he's improving. Show him how paying attention to past mistakes—and correcting them—made a difference. The more he sees this, the more he will believe in his ability to improve.
