#### Names, Numbers: Our Identity

One definition of identity is who we are and the way we think about ourselves. Our identity is also associated with our names. According to American author Ralph Ellison, "It is through our names that we first place ourselves in the world. Our names, being the gift of others, must be made our own." Generally, when we meet someone new, our name is usually the first piece of information about ourselves that we share. It is often one of the first markers of our identity that others learn.

Specific surnames run deep in the early history of the Goessel community as well as the Goessel High School. Understanding the history of education among the Mennonites within the Goessel area helps make the connection between surnames and identity.

Russian Mennonite immigrants had barely settled on the prairies of Kansas when they began discussing the need for educational institutions. Their educational views were firmly entrenched in their particular view of life and they were firm believers in handing down this rich heritage to their children. In order to maintain their identity they needed to continue a school system independent of the American public school system.

Goessel Preparatory School opened its doors the fall of 1906. Twenty years later Goessel High School enrolled seventy-four students for the fall semester. Common original Mennonite names such as; Banman, Bartel, Buller, Duerksen, Flaming, Frey, Funk, Goertzen, Goerzen, Goossen, Hiebert, Janzen, Klassen, Nickel, Ratzlaff, Reimer, Schroeder, Schmidt, Voth, Unruh, plus many others dominated the enrollment list. In the history of the school, there are four surnames that rise to the top. They are Schmidt, Schroeder, Voth, and Unruh.





So which of the five surnames is repeated the most? Using the maiden names of female students, here is the breakdown. The name Schmidt appears 232 times, Voth-108, Schroeder-106 and Unruh-100. In fact, there are only ten years when the name Schmidt is not listed in a graduating class. Although, the name Schmidt does not appear in the first graduating class of 1927, it appears in 1928 until 1986, continuously. For those of you who like statistics, here are a few other numbers. Duerksen-66, Reimer-60, Nickel- 57, Banman, Flaming, Goertzen, and Klassen, 43 each. Actually, there is little diversion from these names until 1982 when twenty-eight percent of the class had names not common to Mennonite origin. The graduating class of 2020 only listed seventeen percent with a common Mennonite surname.

In some ways it is remarkable that a group of non-speaking English immigrants from Russia, would be the catalyst for a quality education system that is still vibrant today. With their foresight they were able to establish a foundation that continues to provide quality education for ALL students, regardless of surnames.

## 2,387 students have graduated from Goessel High School.
